Despite our good work over four decades and the closure of two pumping stations above St Albans, the river continues to live on the edge in a very dry year.

Chairman's and Bailiff's Notes

Sadly the river is in a sorry state this summer with generally very poor flow, although vegetation growth is only too healthy so causing the river to become blocked in many places and some footpaths are becoming overgrown. Where the channel is clogged pooling behind the blockage does mean at least some water can remain to preserve the channel. Our wonderful Action Group has been out each month doing valiant clearance work on banks and paths as always. You can see from the table that the aquifer is now well over six metres below average. Last year as a whole and the winter of 2016/17 were drier than average and the glorious June weather we have been having for most of the month has been anything but glorious for the Ver! The river is now dry through Redbourn and flows further south are very low.

Despite having little, if any, flow to measure our devoted Bailiffs still find plenty to report each month. Yellow flags, ragged robin, water-mint and water forget-me-not are making a good show and hogweed is proving popular with many insects. Where there is enough water most of the usual fish are being reported; there is the usual variety of butterflies but they are not in great numbers; various damselfly and dragonflies are now being seen. Among all the usual bird reports reed, sedge and grasshopper warblers are particularly nice sightings; swallows, martins and swifts are busy catching insects over the water no doubt to feed their young and there are skylarks, grey wagtails, yellowhammers and whitethroats being reported. In Verulamium Park there were about seven heron nests this year which have been followed by two pairs of little egrets. John Fisher reports that 12 young barn owls were ringed in late June. Sadly the little owls had only one surviving owlet.

We are very pleased that Richard Wallis, a keen Action group volunteer, has agreed to be co-opted join our Committee and those of you on Facebook or Twitter will have enjoyed the regular updates and photos thanks to John Pritchard, who is also our new Membership Secretary – you can also access these posts on our website. Our Webmaster, Paul Foster is hoping to renew the Website with the help of a sub-committee in the near future.

On a sadder note we are going to lose our Bailiff for Markyate, David Coasy, this autumn when he moves to Devon. He has rarely had much of a river on which to report but has been active in clearing rubbish etc from the dry river bed and flagging up other issues in the area. We thank him most sincerely for all he has done. If anyone from the top end of our valley might be interested in taking over please contact me; a fairly general report every couple of months or so is all that is needed there.

Please note our membership year runs from September 1st to August 31st. Annual and five year subscription members with renewals falling due this September will receive a reminder to renew via email or post in the next few weeks.

Thank you to all of our many volunteers who have given up their time to clear debris from the river, clear footpaths and continue to remove Himalayan Balsam along the river banks from Park Street Mill through Frogmore Pits, down to the Ver Colne confluence in Bricket Wood.

As you know, Himalayan Balsam is an invasive weed, which grows along the banks of waterways up to 1.5 m high, with its pink flowers appearing in June onwards, producing succulent fruits, which when ripe, explode and send their seeds downstream, to invade the river bank and block out light to our native species. So working with the CMS volunteers, Tarmac and local residents we ask that you pull up this plant wherever you see it along the Ver, disposing of it away from the river.

Summer / Autumn 2017 Programme

Saturday July 15th, 2017 10.00-12.00

- i) The grounds of Moor Mill and down to Smug Oak Lane to remove Himalayan Balsam, both banks of the Ver and the Mill Stream (park at Moor Mill)
- ii) For those with waders, working downstream from Sycamore Close and behind the Beeches, to the Radlett Road bridge, Park Street, removing Himalayan Balsam (Park in Sycamore Close, or the car park north of Park Street Mill)
- iii) At 12.00, both groups to meet at Moor Mill for a thank you drink

Saturday, August 19th, 2017 10.00-12.00

Please Park at the Drop Lane car park, to walk down Riverside Way / Drop Lane removing Himalayan Balsam along the banks down to the Confluence and any debris in the river.

Saturday September 16th, 2017 10.00-12.00

Frogmore Pits. Please park at Hyde Lane or Moor Mill Lane to:

- i) To have a final clearance of Himalayan Balsam
- ii) Clear the two footpaths along the river of bramble and scrub.

Saturday October 21st, 2017 10.00-12.00

Sopwell Nunnery Green. Please park at the allotment car park, off Sopwell Mill Farm Lane, off Cotton Mill Lane.

- i) To clear bramble, saplings and weeds around the laid hedge
- ii) Clear any blockages in the river
- iii) Clear any saplings along the river bank.

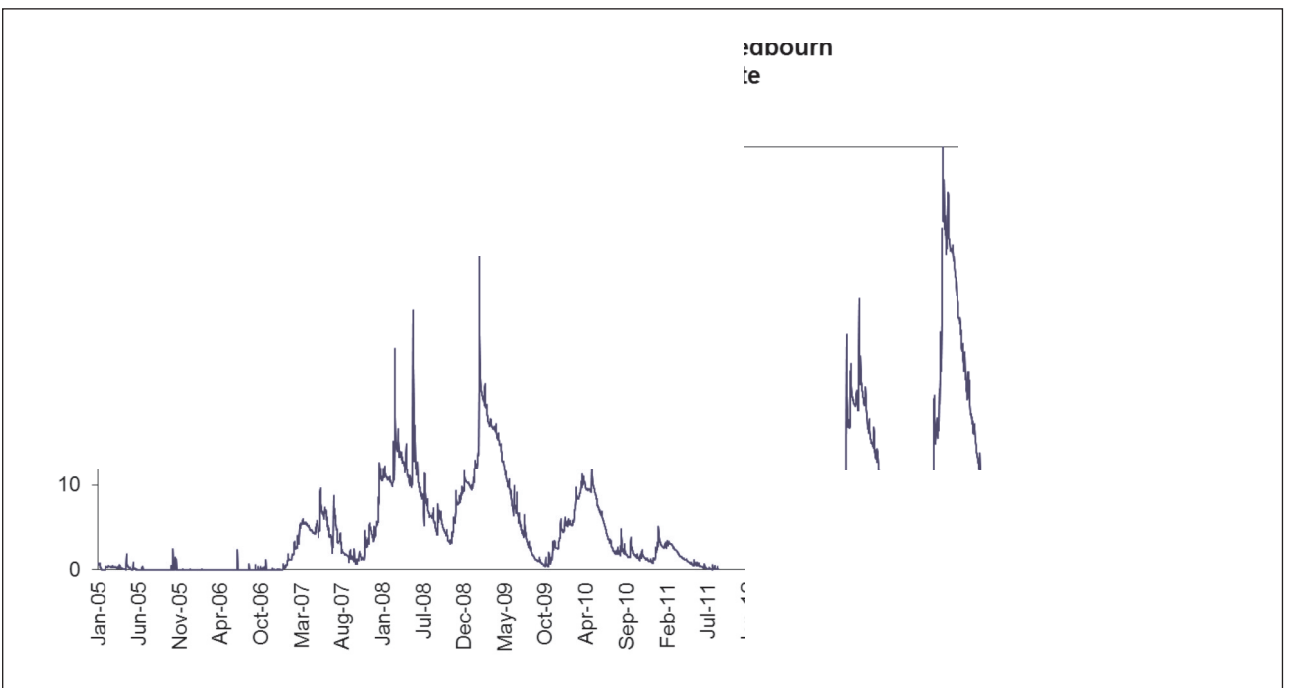
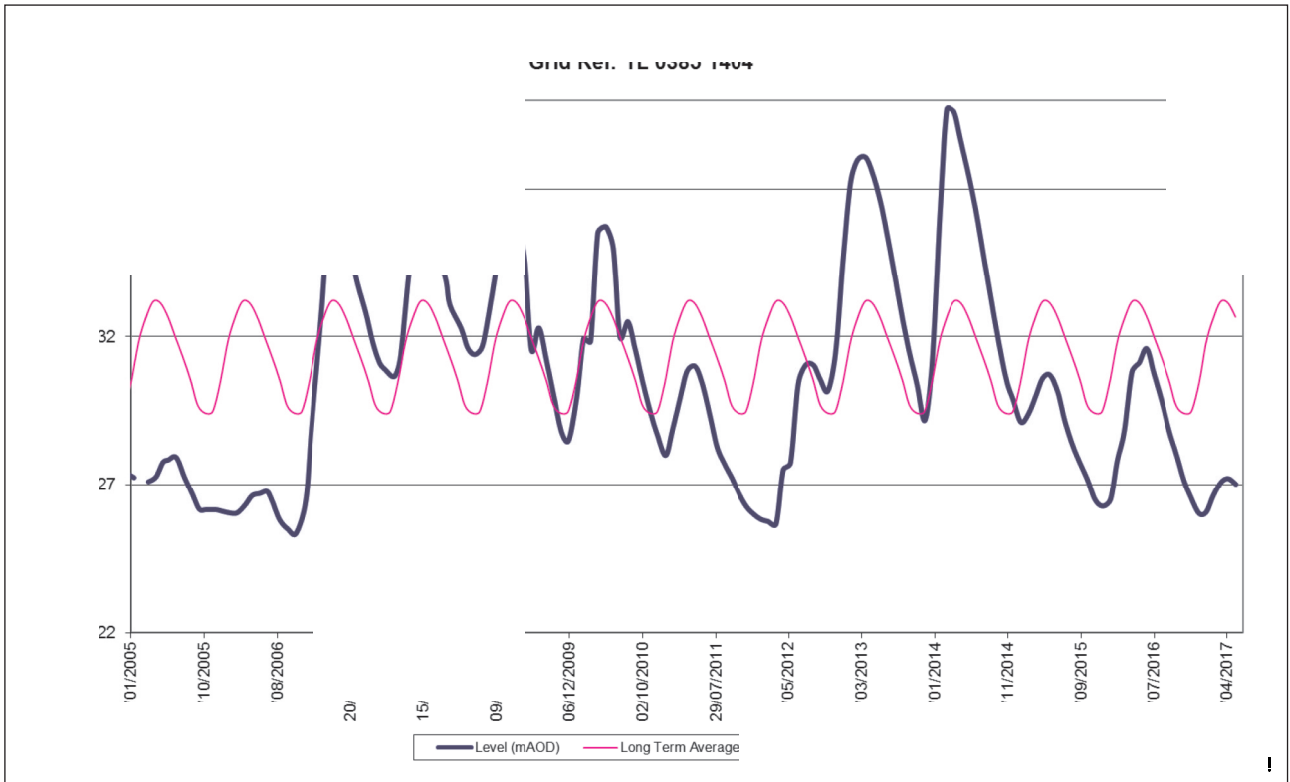
